

Andréanne Morin

Andréanne Morin represented Canada at three Olympic Games in the Women's 8 in rowing, winning a silver medal in London in 2012, finishing 4th in Beijing in 2008 and 7th in Athens in 2004. She participated in seven World Championships and climbed onto the podium with back to back silver medals in 2010 and 2011 and earned a bronze medal in 2003.

Since the London Games, Andréanne has retired from rowing, but remains involved in the Olympic movement and in the sports world. In 2011, she was appointed to the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) Athlete Committee where she is currently serving a second term. As part of this group of current and former world athletes, she enjoyed the recent revision of the World Anti-doping Code, in which the athletes' input and recommendations were significant, and she found the legal analysis and the drafting of the provisions a fascinating process.

Andréanne's involvement with the Canadian Olympic Committee (COC) dates back to 2010. As a member of the Athletes' Commission, she promotes all matters that are athlete-related within the COC and helps athletes understand their rights and responsibilities within the Olympic movement.

Throughout her athletic career, Andréanne has juggled her studies. After completing her high school in Montréal, she attended Phillips Exeter Academy in New Hampshire and graduated in 2006 with a Bachelor of Arts in Political Economy from Princeton University, where she was also a NCAA rowing champion. In 2013, she graduated from the Faculty of Law of the University of Montréal.

Professionally, Andréanne is a lawyer at Blake, Cassels & Graydon LLP in Montréal. Her practice focuses primarily on domestic and cross-border mergers and acquisitions as well as general corporate and commercial matters.
